## ASSEMBLY VOTES SANCTIONS AGAINST RHODESIA REGIME

THE UN General Assembly meeting currently at UN Headquarters in New York with the participation of the Organisation's 122 Member States, last week approved a resolution calling for total and mandatory economic sanctions, backed by the use of force, in an effort to topple the white minority regime of Mr. Ian Smith in Rhodesia.

The resolution said that selective mandatory sanctions already decreed by the UN Security Council would not achieve this objective.

The final vote on the resolution — similar to the one taken earlier in Committee session (see **BLUE BERET** of 1 November 1967) — was 92 in favour, with South Africa and Portugal voting against, and 18 nations abstaining among them Great Britain and other Western, as well as Scandinavian, States.

The resolution condemned what is described as Great Britain's failure and refusal to take effective measures against the Smith regime. It called upon Great Britain to act immediately to secure a majority rule in Rhodesia, to expel South African armed forces from the territory, and to see to the release of African nationalists detained there.

## SECURITY COUNCIL

## EFFORTS PRESSED TO SEEK UN MIDDLE EAST SOLUTION

LAST week was marked by intensive consultations in New York among the ten non-permanent members of the 15-nation UN Security Council in an effort to arrive at a basis for Council action toward a solution to the present Middle East crisis.

At week's end, the Council President — Mr. Mamadou Kante of Mali — said he had been authorized to inform the five permanent Council members — United Kingdom, France, China, the Soviet Union and the United States — of the progress which had been made and to invite their cooperation in overcoming the remaining difficulties.

Ambassador Kante said the ten non-permanent members had not reached agreement on precise proposals to be put before the Council. They had, however, reached a new stage in their discussions. They had agreed on three principles which would govern Council at this time.

The first, he said, was that action taken would be within Chapter VI of the United Nations Charter — that is to say, it would be persuasive rather than enforcement action.

Secondly, that the UN Secretary-General should appoint a Special Representative.

## UNFICYP ORGANIZES SECOND ROAD SAFETY WEEK

A n UNFICYP Road Safety Week involving all vehicles of the Force will be held from 1200 hrs, 13 November to 1200 hrs, 20 November.

This important event follows soon after the Safety Week of September last in an effort to improve upon its success and to impress upon new members of the Contingents the paramount importance of safe driving in Cyprus.

When you realise that during the past 3½ years only one UN Soldier has been killed directly in the course of peacekeeping operations yet 31 have been killed and

775 injured in traffic accidents the moral is clear. You are careful enough in handling your weapons, why not your vehicle also, it can be equally as lethal.

The motto for the last safety week was "Defensive Driving", for this one it will be "Foresight". It is the duty of every road user to read the road ahead, to judge his speed, the position of his vehicle in relation to other, and to indicate his intentions early so that there is plenty of time and space to cope with any emergency.

The UN Road Safety Committee has informed the **Blue Beret** that special checks will be carried out to monitor speed, courtesy and driving techniques during the week.

## KING OF NEPAL ADDRESSES UN BODY

I N an address to the UN General Assembly last Monday afternoon, King Mahendra of Nepal said that his country's faith in the United Nations remained unshaken despite its failure to do all that small countries wished it would. He felt that the UN had been able to develop a world consensus against evils such as colonialism, imperialism and racism. These had not been eliminated, but mankind's moral judgement was against them.

## ASSEMBLY HOLDS OFF ACTION ON MIDDLE EAST DEBATE

T HE President of the UN General Assembly, Foreign Minister Cornelius Manescu (Romania), said at a luncheon press conference in New York last week that the Assembly was not yet in a position to resume its deliberations on the Middle East since efforts to find a solution acceptable to all parties were still going on.

Mr. Manescu said consultations of the past three weeks had been generally useful, but

that the problem was still difficult and a solution had not been found.

In answer to a question, the Assembly President said a resolution acceptable to all parties should take into account the right of every State in the region to existence and development, the region's security, renunciation of territorial gains acquired by force, and the need for a climate in which the problems of 20 years' standing, could be solved.





## POLITISTATIONEN i KAZAPHANI

En af de mest særprægede af de mangeartede opgaver, som blev pålagt dansk politi, da det for snart 4 år siden intrådte i FN's fredsbewarende styrke i Cypern, er bemanningen af "politistationen" i KAZAPHANI.

Kazaphani er en relativ lille landsby på vel omkring 1000 indbyggere. Den er beliggende 3-4 miles sydøst for Kyrenia i det frugtbare lavland nord for Kyreniabergkæden. Landsbyen hører til de såkaldte "blandede" samfund og der er omtrent lige mange af græskypriotisk og af tyrkisk-cypriotisk herkomst. Landsbyen ligger i såkaldt regeringskontrollområde.

Stationen er døgnet rundt bemanded med 2 politifolk. Vagten skiftes kl. 0800 hver morgen og hvert hold opholder sig et døgn på posten.

Formålet med vor tilstedsvarsel på dette sted er naturligvis at forhindre, at episoder finder sted mellem de to befolkningsgrupper, der her - som næsten alle andre steder - har placeret sig i hver sin bydel, og det er da også lykkedes hidtil at undgå episoder af nævneværdig art. Posten har væben til rådighed, men bærer ikke disse i den daglige tjeneste. Der er radioforbindelse til politidetachementet i Kyrenia, og i øvrigt er stationen radiomæssigt så velplaceret, at der uden vanskelighed kan etableres radiokontakt også til DANCIVPOLS HQ i Nicosia, til CANCON og hvem der ellers kan opstå behov for at kontakte. Tjenesten består af patruljering i området, indrapportering af alt af interesse og så i øvrigt ikke mindst dette at "være til stede". Alt, hvad der passerer i døgnets løb, indføres i stationens logbog, og de gamle udskrevne logbøger kan godt være interessant læsning. De handler ikke alene om skumle mænd med "skydere", men også om mennesker i nød, som tillidsfuldt har henvendt sig på "politista-


On arrival at Group Headquarters at Xeros the visitors were welcomed by Lt Col M.J. Murphy.

At the conclusion of the tour the visitors were entertained in the forenoon the party toured the Lefka Company area the officers mess at Xeros Camp.



## WORLD POPULATION TO DOUBLE BY 2005, UN REPORT STATES

THE world's population will double by the year 2005 if it continues to grow at its present rate, according to UN statistics made public at UN Headquarters early this week.

The UN Demographic Yearbook for 1966 gave the total population at mid-year as about 3,356 million inhabitants — the rate of increase was close to 2 percent a year.

The Yearbook reported that nearly three quarters of the earth's inhabitants lived in the poorer countries. One half of the total was in Asia.

The death rate in poorer areas was twice that in more affluent regions, and the birth

rate also twice as high.

The highest rate of population growth was found in Central America; the lowest, in Western Europe. On the basis of present growth rates, the population of mainland China would double over the next half century; that of India would treble, Brazil would have a four-fold increase, and the US and USSR would double.

## UN MOVES TO INCREASE ITS WORK ON OUTER SPACE USES

THE United Nations General Assembly now meeting at UN Headquarters in New York, last week unanimously approved recommendations by its Main Political Committee for growing international cooperation in the peaceful uses of outer space.

One resolution calls for continuance of existing programs and enquiries, and launching of new ones, in fields such as weather forecasting, communications, and navigation aids with the help of satellites.

The resolution urges the UN Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space to con-

## NETHERLANDS PRINCE AWARDED NANSEN MEDAL

THE Prince of the Netherlands was awarded last week the Nansen Medal for outstanding services rendered to the cause of refugees, in recognition of his leadership of the European Refugee Campaign 1966, which raised 18 million dollars for refugees in Africa and Asia.

In accepting the medal at a ceremony at the Palais des Nations attended by Swiss authorities, the diplomatic corps, senior international officials, heads of voluntary agencies active in refugee work and representatives of committees which organised the twenty-country drive last year, the Prince made the first public disclosure of the proceeds of the campaign.

The European campaign began on United Nations Day, 24 October 1966, which had been dedicated to the cause of refugees by the General Assembly of the United Nations. Seventeen European countries: Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Leichtenstein, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Switzerland, the United Kingdom and Yugoslavia acted simultaneously, together with Australia and New Zealand. Sweden held its drive in the spring of this year.

The Nansen Medal is named after Fridtjof Nansen, the first League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and a pioneer in refugee and famine relief work in Europe in the period following the first World War.

## CONGO URGES ACTION ON "MERCENARIES"

The Democratic Republic of the Congo has charged that foreign mercenaries have entered into the southern part of her territory from Portuguese-controlled Angola and has requested the UN Security Council to meet in order to deal with this incursion.

tinue its work on an international agreement on liability for damage caused by outer space vehicles, and another on aid to be furnished to astronauts in distress. It also asks the Committee to press ahead with efforts to define just where outer space begins, and to study the technical feasibility of communications by direct broadcasts from satellites.

Another resolution urges the widest participation in next year's International Conference in Vienna on the exploitation and the peaceful uses of outer space — particularly on the part of under-developed countries.
